

# PALMERSTON NORTH SCALE CLASSIC

Flown at Fieldings Taionui Aerodrome, Sat.14th and Sun.15th March. Report by Harvey Stiver.

We travelled to Fielding on Saturday morning, arriving at the field at about 12 noon. It was a pleasant day, but overcast with light winds and occasional drizzle.

A large turnout on Saturday saw all classes of scale models from liger Moths to warbirds, biplanes to modern ducted fan jets. The day was very well organised by the Palmerston North Aeroneers. Models were inspected by safety officers and flying models were restricted to six in the air\*at any one time.

I flew my quarter-scale Aeronca Champion on the Saturday, with Barrie Roberts and Peter Sharpe acting as observers and pitcrew. Leicester Harris was also in attendance with a Model Shop display. Saturday evening was spent at our motel over a few drinks and a lot of model talk.

On Sunday the turnout was larger: over 45 models were on the pit line. Very impressive. We witnessed a catapult launching of a Byron F-16 ducted fan model which was very fast and realistic in the air, but landed almost at a standstill-an incredible flight speed range.

Barrie Roberts and Peter Sharpe took part in the Sunday flying using my Aeronca Champ fitted with Barrie's radio gear. I then flew my 44" Smiths Miniplane. Both Peter and Barrie flew well, giving me no worries.

Flying finished at about 3.30pm with a prize-giving following. Although the PN Scale Classic is a rally rather than a competition, prizes are awarded for various classes such as technical achievement, concours d'elegance.

This event is firmly established as a popular scale rally and I wish the PN Aeroneers continued success. I enjoy meeting modellers from other centres to exchange ideas and to compare notes. See you there next year!

# 12.3.87 Special Meeting

- 1. Committee policy. Meeting format. Responsibilities of committee members.
- Flying field levy. Various options discussed. Unanimous decision on: \$50 per year, payable in two \$25 instalments if desired. Applies to all senior members, No levy on juniors, ie under 18yrs. Part-year payments on pro-rata basis. Non payment = no flying. Casual field use available - \$5 per day. Visiting flyers not required to pay. Prospective Club members given a reasonable period of grace.
- 3. New members pay joining fee of \$25.
- 4. Magazine format. An upgrading of magazine format to be attempted. Card covers from May issue. Selling of advertising space to off-set costs. Photocopier purchase to be investigated.
- Membership pack. To be presented to all paid-up members and all new members-(once only). To contain: Club stickers, Club rule book, Name peg for use on peg-board and as identification.
- Club house, field development. Details of these will be announced as soon as the committee's investigations are complete.
- 7. Future locations of committee meetings.
- 8. Club meetings. Topic for next Club night. Those having tea/coffee at meetings to clean up their own dishes. Donation system to continue.




