Periods of heavy rain in both Napier and Hastings did not auger well for the second of the Club competition events, but despite cool conditions and the close passage of heavy falls, competitors and helpers remained dry.

With the wind at ninety degrees to the slope, averaging 10kts, conditions were ideal for all but the lightest models, and some fast times were recorded in the four rounds that each competitor flew.

The site was shared with five hang-glider pilots who also found conditions ideal for both distance and duration flights - one was last seen disappearing into the distance, rounding Cape Kidnappers heading for Clifton, while others flew effortlessly up and down the slope.

There was an interesting exchange of information between the pilots of both types of gliders, and a point that many of us noticed was the sophistication of the modern double-skinned hang gliders. Variometers, altimeters and wind speed indicators were in use, along with protective body stockings that the pilot zipped into once airborne. Cost of a bare airframe was quoted at about \$3500 - still the cheapest way to fly your own aircraft.

In the never-ending search for 'something interesting' for Club nights, it was decided to hold at the February meeting another build and fly evening, with the subject this time being paper model aircraft- paper darts to the uninspired.

The turnout at the meeting was one of the lowest for some time, but almost everyone who was there took part in the folding and flying of divers aerial devices that ranged from a delicate tissue model, gracefully launched on tip-toes by John Urry, to heavyweight projectiles whose flight path relied upon launch momentum rather than aerodynamic principles.

Two tasks faced the competitors - maximum flight duration and accuracy of flight, the latter being tested by attempting to have the model land in a cardboard box in the middle of the hall. The accuracy needed for this highly skilled aiming task was attained only by Graham Main, whose launch technique owes much to the Japanese tea ceremony. John Sutherland attempted to imitate this style, but lacked the inner tranquility, facial expressions, and loose-kneed stance that Graham has perfected over the years.
